



JRS has been working in the capital Amman since 2008, focusing on serving, accompanying and advocating for refugee minorities coming from the Middle East and Africa. These communities are often overlooked by major humanitarian actors and face heavy legal limitations in accessing services and enjoy full and equal human rights, and a life in dignity. Through a wide range of activities, JRS Jordan has favored the creation of a community that thrives on mutual respect, support, intercultural dialogue and solidarity in keeping hope alive. JRS provides a safe space where people can nurture their talents and build stronger cohesive and diverse communities. We envision a society where diversity is considered an enrichment and not a barrier, where everyone recognizes and appreciates our shared humanity. We envision a world where everyone feel home, accepted and respected.

What refugees minorities face

- Impossibility to enter the labor market
- Detention and deportation risk
- Discrimination based on the color of the skin
- Extended time of displacement
- Lack of agency over their life choices
- Limited access to services by NGOs and UN agencies

... and, as a result:

- Higher vulnerability
- Lack of feeling of safety
- Lack of perspectives for the future
- Loss of purpose in life
- Feelings of being forgotten and abandoned





One Refugee Approach

JRS Jordan provides its services impartially and without discrimination, and advocates for the rights of the most vulnerable.

Our services and activities are open to refugees from Syria, Iraq, Yemen, Sudan, Somalia, Eritrea, and other countries, as well as to Jordanians and Palestinians and vulnerable individuals of all nationalities.

We create moments of encounter and participation, and a space where all refugee communities living in Jordan can share their voice.

JRS has been providing language classes, digital skills trainings and other learning opportunities; mental health support, social cohesion and community-building initiatives.

JRS Jordan current focus is on reconciliation (social cohesion and peace-building among all communities, refugees and local ones) and empowerment of refugees.

Advocacy

The advocacy work of JRS aims at providing space and opportunities for refugees to speak up about their needs and challenges, and to become active advocates for their communities.

JRS advocates for the provision of services and rights to all refugees equally, regardless of nationality, following the so-called One Refugee Approach (ORA). JRS' advocacy approach is ground-up, participatory and rooted in closeness to communities.

JRS Committee is the cornerstone of JRS' advocacy efforts in Jordan. Established in 2022, the Committee is a group of representatives from different refugee communities including Sudan, Somalia, Syria, Yemen, Eritrea, Iraq. The members work collaboratively with the JRS team on advocacy, awareness-raising, and community mobilizing. Over the past years, the Committee has worked to develop its advocacy priorities, research, presentations, and awareness-raising content.

The Committee has been trained in conflict resolution, global advocacy basics, and public speaking. During 2024, JRS collaborated with AFSC (American Friends Service Committee) to support this initiative.







Accompaniment for JRS Jordan means creation and provision of a safe space for refugees, support, guidance and assistance through their journey of healing, learning and keeping hope alive.

JRS intervenes in emergency situation with referrals and connections to other NGOs that can provide support. JRS mentors and guide refugees in building a life path according to their talents and aspirations.

JRS Community Centre is a safe space for refugees, where someone is always available to actively listen to them, understand their needs, give them the possibility of sharing and opening up about their concerns.
